Farewell Message from City Manager Carlos Martinez

Dear East Palo Alto residents, City Council and staff:

As many of you know, I have accepted the position as City Manager of the City of Richmond. My last day as City Manager in East Palo Alto will be October 12, 2018.



It has been my great privilege and honor to serve this community for the past 15 years most of that time leading the City's Redevelopment Agency, and leading the entire organization as City Manager since December 2014. East Palo Alto has seen tremendous growth and change during my tenure. Change is usually controversial and difficult, but it is part of maturing, it happens naturally and it is an inevitable process that never stops.

All along, this and past City Councils have been directing and managing these changes in a very deliberate manner to maximize the benefits to the community. As a result, the City remains an oasis for the multicultural, multiethnic and multi-income community that is East Palo Alto, a progressive City where there is place for everyone regardless of culture, color, income or creed.

I firmly believe that the City's trajectory has been one of constant improvement and now, the City of East Palo Alto is much better than it was 15 years ago. Furthermore, we made a lot of progress in the last three years in a number of critical areas, including affordable housing, economic development, public safety, strengthening the City's finances and personnel, and in the areas of water supply, flood protection, and transportation infrastructure.

All of this has been only possible with the support of our community, the leadership of the City Council, and the commitment of dedicated staff. I am and will be forever grateful and honored to have been part of this incredible team that has accomplished so much under challenging circumstances. I know East Palo Alto's future is bright and greater things lie ahead.

Serenity Senior Apartments wins Silicon Valley Structures Award

Serenity Senior Apartments was nominated as Best Affordable Residential Project by the Silicon Valley Business Journal (SVBJ) at the SVBJ Structures Awards event on September 10th.



The Senior Affordable Housing project, located on University Avenue in East Palo Alto, was constructed by nonprofit developers

EPA CAN DO and Midpen Housing in an effort to provide the seniors of the community with affordable housing. The well received apartment complex has proved to be of great service for members of the community and is a great accomplishment for the community and the organizations that helped make its construction possible.

Willow Road and Connector Ramps Closure

Caltrans will close Willow Road and connecting ramps to U.S. Route 101 (U.S.-101) in Menlo Park for 54 hours, beginning 10:00 PM, Friday, October 5, 2018, until 4:00 AM, Monday, October 8, 2018, to allow workers to shift lanes on the Willow Road overpass onto newly-built bridges.



During the closure, Caltrans will pave two sections of roadway to connect Willow Road to the new bridges. In the new configuration, motorists traveling eastbound or westbound will navigate slightly to the right to access the new bridges. Through-traffic on U.S.-101 will not be detoured; only traffic that normally would take the Willow Road Exit will be detoured.


